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How the Event Works - The Competition

The Competition

Both teams and individuals will compete for fantastic prizes on two levels: Dollars Raised and the Epic Mix Challenge. Prizes include a K2 snowboard, lodging, Breckenridge Mountain Money, gift cards, and much more!

The Course and Epic Mix Competition Tracking

While at the Hope on the Slopes event, participants will receive points through the Epic Mix tracking system by skiing or riding all over the mountain. Through vertical feet and various virtual pins awarded (scavenger hunt items), points will be awarded for participants. Information about the vertical rise of each chair lift is found on the trail map under Lift Stats which will help you plan your day!

Vertical feet, virtual pins, and points earned will be tracked through the Epic Mix tracking system. Each pre-registered participant has a hard lift pass to wear during the event and has the Epic Mix chip system embedded. Virtual pins point areas will be discussed in detail at Opening Ceremonies.

Because participants have access to the whole mountain and the Epic Mix Challenge is competitive, please ski or ride within your skill level and follow the Responsibility Code.

Determining the Winners

For team vertical feet and Epic Mix points, to ensure fairness no matter the size of a team, the points earned will be divided by the number of members registered on the team and the average will be used to determine the team winners. Teams with the highest dollars raised will win that category, regardless of size.

Individuals who are competing without a team as well as those who are on teams qualify to compete for individual Epic Mix Challenge and fundraising prize categories. Winners will be announced at closing ceremonies.

Online Registration Deadline: Wednesday, February 22nd

Registrations will still be open online until Friday, February 24th, but those registering after Feb 22nd at 12:00pm MST will not be included in the Epic Mix Challenge.

Two Participation Options:

- Participate on a Team
 - Form or join a team of 2-10 members
 - Registration is \$200 per team and can be waived by event sponsorship (sponsorship forms are available online)
 - Fundraising minimum for inclusion in Epic Mix team competition prizes is \$200 per member total. For example, a team of 8 would need to raise at least \$1600 to compete for vertical feet prizes.
- Participate as an Individual
 - Registration fee is \$35
 - Fundraising minimum for inclusion in individual Epic Mix competition prizes is \$200

BONUS! Participants that register online and pay required registration fees by January 31st are guaranteed a 2011 HOTS event shirt!

Turning in donations, registration fees, and matching funds

Registration fees and fundraising dollars can be paid/collected online (preferred method), mailed to the ACS office (address below)) or brought in person to the event and must be turned in/showing up online by 10am on the day of the event. Online fundraising will be tracked until 10am on the day of the event.

Matching funds will be counted towards fundraising totals. Teams expecting matching funds need to mail/fax their matching funds form to ACS prior to the event by Wednesday Feb 22nd at 2:00pm or bring the form to the event.

Adults: \$48.00, Kids ages 5-12: \$33.00 For those HOTS participants without a season pass to Breckenridge and have paid their registration fees, discounted lift tickets are available. Because of the use of Epic Mix, pass holders must provide their pass number during the online registration process or select the option to purchase a discounted pass.

Discounted Equipment Rentals - courtesy of Breckenridge Sports:

Participants needing to rent skis, snowboards, and boots can go online to **www.rentskis.com/hope** where HOTS participants will receive a 40% rental discount when booked online and 20% discount as a walk-up. This website allows you to enter in your boot size and other information and your rental will be waiting for you at the Breckenridge Sports location within The Maggie at the Peak 9 Base. This discount is good for Friday, February 24th through Sunday, February 26th.

Discounted Lunch Vouchers - courtesy of Breckenridge Ski Resort:

A free \$10 lunch voucher is available for the first 250 checked-in participants and are valid at on-mountain restaurants. Vouchers are good for a one-time purchase with no change given if you spend less than the \$10. Vouchers can be picked up at check-in prior to the start of the event.




All Paid Lots are free after 2pm (Town of Breckenridge Lots above are free after 3pm)

Mountain Safety

Hope on the Slopes is a competitive event and we realize you will be trying to ski or ride as much of the mountain as you can. However, you are still held responsible for the Responsibility Code and any Breckenridge employee in uniform is empowered to suspend or revoke the skiing or riding privileges of anyone demonstrating reckless or inappropriate behavior.

Always show courtesy to others and be aware that there are elements of risk in skiing and snowboarding that common sense and personal awareness can help reduce. Know your ability level and stay within it.

Your Responsibility Code:

- 1. Always stay in control, and be able to stop or avoid other people or objects.
- 2. People ahead of you have the right of way. It is your responsibility to avoid them.
- 3. You must not stop where you obstruct a trail or are not visible from above.
- 4. Whenever starting downhill or merging into a trail, look uphill and yield to others
- 5. Always use devices to help prevent runaway equipment.
- 6. Observe all posted signs and warnings. Keep off closed trails and out of closed areas.
- 7. Prior to using any lift, you must have the knowledge and ability to load, ride and unload safely.

A Week in the Life of the American Cancer Society in Colorado

On average EACH week the American Cancer Society provides the following services and programs to reduce the impact of cancer in Colorado:

- 5,747 visits are made by state residents to www.cancer.org
- 160 people contact the American Cancer Society from our state via our 24-hour information line at 1-800-227-2345
- 151 state residents receive cancer patient related information or services from the American Cancer Society
- 6 visits are made to breast cancer patients by one of our Reach To Recovery volunteers
- 85 trips transporting cancer patients to treatment are provided by American Cancer Society Road to Recovery volunteers and other transportation programs
- 47 gift items such as turbans, prosthesis, or durable medical equipment are provided to cancer patients living in our state
- 33 wigs are provided to residents in our state
- 13 free or reduced rate accommodation is provided through our Patient Lodging program to cancer patients and their families traveling long distances for treatment

We **save lives** and create more birthdays by helping you stay well, helping you get well, by finding cures, and by fighting back.



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Winter and Summer Sessions Available!

Hope Mountain Camp is a special program for brothers and sisters (ages 11-17) of children who have been diagnosed with cancer. The program is funded by the American Cancer Society, and is a joint effort of the American Cancer Society and The Breckenridge Outdoor Education Center.


